

The Canadian Sugar Market



- Canada refined sugar production 1.3 mln tonnes
- 90% cane sugar from imported raw sugar (<u>0 duty</u>)
- Exports:
 - 4-5 % is exported given U.S. and other foreign trade barriers; mostly beet sugar given rules of origin
 - 40% of refined cane sugar is exported in finished food products given sugar price advantage in Canada








Canadian sugar prices follow world trends














Canadian Beet Sugar Production

Severe weather reduced 2019/20 crop by 45% Expected 125,000 MT down to 65,000 MT
















Canada Imports Raw Sugar for Refining












Canadian production growth mostly linked to Exports of sugar-containing food products to U.S.














Added sugars consumption, per capita














Added sugars consumption, per capita








Canadian sugar availability/consumption (Soft Drinks proxy for decline in HFCS use)












Canadian sugar availability/consumption (variable substitution liquid sugar for HFCS)

SUGAR CONSUMPTION, Canada (kg per capita)












Canada Liquid Sugar Shipments vs. World raw sugar price












Canadian Export Destinations Limited by Trade Barriers












Canadian Exports Refined Sugar to the United States

TRQ Increases During Emergency Shortages












NAFTA 2.0 = CUSMA / USMCA / T-MEC



- MAINTAINS Canada-specific allocations of US WTO Quotas
 - Refined beet sugar 10,300 MT



SCPs 59,250 MT (retail ready)

CALENDAR YEAR TRQs for CANADA

SUGAR – 9,600 MT beet sugar

- If US increases WTO refined sugar TRQ:
 - ✓ Canada share is 20% can be refined cane sugar
 - ✓ Does not alter Canada's rights for an increase of the 10,300 MT TRQ

Sugar-containing products – 9,600 MT

✓ No limitations on end use; i.e., can be shipped food service, restaurants, institutions, food manufacturing











CUSMA CANADA - UNITED STATES - MEXICO



- Signed on November 30, 2018
- Amendments signed December 10, 2019
- Ratified in US and Mexico
- Canadian ratification process underway
- Complete in March or April?
